## Backcountry Best Practices

- **1.** Follow the guidance of USFS & NPS rangers. Their job is to educate, enforce, and keep you safe.
- **2.** Camp at least 100 feet away from water. Do not camp on vegetation and avoid expanding use area.
- **3.** Dig bathroom catholes a minimum of 6 inches deep and at least 100 feet away from water. Do not bury toilet paper.
- **4.** Pack out all of your trash, including food scraps and toilet paper.
- **5.** Do not use soap in or near water. Be at least 100 feet away from any water source before use.
- **6.** Properly store food and scented items in bear-proof canisters.
- **7.** Do not follow, disturb, or interfere with wildlife.
- 8. Travel on durable terrain and avoid expanding trails.
- **9.** Leave indigenous artifacts including obsidian shards, pottery, and petroglyphs undisturbed, and notify a ranger of their location.
